A good crop starts with planting the right variety using high-quality plant material. So, in this edition of *CaneConnection*, we preview three new varieties selected by the Herbert Variety Adoption Committee for production in that region. After you have chosen the most appropriate variety for your farm, you need sound planting material protected by appropriate fungicides to lay the foundation for future success. Because pour rate and ground speed affect ratoonnability, we have one article that discusses the impact that these two related harvesting parameters can have on your next crop.

Finally, we have included an article on nutgrass, that hard-to-manage weed that has the potential to rob you of yield in a number of ways. The article offers some possible management solutions that can be utilised to get it under control.
